Infant mortality rate compares the number of deaths of infants under one year old in a given year per 1,000 live births in the same year. This rate is often used as an indicator of the level of health in a country.

For the year 2014, The United States ranks 55th in having the highest infant mortality rate among the 224 Nations evaluated by the CIA—a national disgrace.

It was stated:

Much has changed in the 50 years since the NICHD came to be. For example:

• The U.S. infant mortality rate in 1962 was 25.3 deaths per 1,000 live births; today, the U.S. infant mortality rate is 6 deaths per 1,000 live births. (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention [CDC] and Central Intelligence Agency World Fact Book, respectively)

The International record tells a different story, as illustrated above where the United States infant mortality rate ranks **55**th among the **224** the Nations of the World ranked by the CIA. **Cuba** and **Poland** have better infant morality rates than the U.S. and are healthier countries by this criteria.

A similar picture has existed for decades and it is recommended that the Congress demand form the NIH a comparable statistical record over the past twenty years that would document the miserable record of failure of the NIH on this singular measure. Comparable information should also be demanded for **maternal mortality** and **child mortality** rates.
